Proposed future developments

Current classrooms at Gurteen can best be descried as 'tired' and classroom space will become tight as additional courses are developed and launched. Today, in 2022, one of our main teaching rooms is McKinney Hall - an original college building dating back to the 1940's; it's high ceiling, wooden floor and long narrow shape will be familiar to all our readers, as will the very poor acoustics and high windows! Our ambition is to ensure future developments at the Gurteen campus provide modern student facilities that will complement the superb yard and workshops. The clear ambition is to provide our students with the very best 21st century College experience.

New teaching accommodation is the most pressing need at Gurteen, as nearly all the 434 m² of currently available /used teaching space is not suitable and very outdated. The architects have developed designs for a new teaching block that includes 410m² of bespoke modern teaching space. The drawings provide a strong impression of what the building may look like and how it would 'sit' within the existing campus. The design aims to offer a clear modern approach to college buildings whilst complementing our existing campus. The positioning of the building purposefully builds upon the established link between theory teaching and practical demonstration by creating a direct thoroughfare from the main building to the teaching block and onto the archway.

Internally the building offers a double height lobby and atrium, first floor access via stairs and lift, circulation areas and toilets, on both floors. Each floor includes two 30 seat classrooms and one 60 seat room. Final use and exact layout of rooms can be flexible and may include bespoke laboratory and IT rooms.

And so, the journey begins! As a college community we are excited to be embarking on this ambitious development project however we understand there will be challenges along the way. Our initial step will be to seek planning permission from Tipperary County Council and to focus thereafter on raising funds to cover the build cost. We have some money set aside but this will by no means be enough to get us to completion. Our Governors and Trustees have brought together a small team to guide the fundraising process and we hope that through the generosity of friends and partners of Gurteen we will manage to make this project a reality. In our history our College community bravely and successfully faced similar challenges to make Gurteen the wonderful place it is today. Now it's time to see how we can contribute and secure the next 75 years of Gurteen- delivering 'education for a sustainable future.'

Course Updates

The academic year always presents the opportunity for a fresh start. Compared with September 2021, we have had very little conversation about Covid-19. This is the first September induction since 2019 where we have been operating "business as usual" to the immense relief of staff and students.

Level 5 Certificate in Agriculture

The first week of the Level 5 course is filled with induction. Students are introduced to the staff and the academic expectations are outlined. The college student handbook is brought to their attention, the timetable is explained, and each student does a tractor driving practical to establish the baseline and identify who might need additional support. Students also do health and safety training where they cover basic cattle handling skills, manual handling and zoonotic disease and hand hygiene.

Level 6 Advanced Certificate in Agriculture

The last 8 weeks has seen our Level 6 students take the opportunity to do an Al course with Dovea genetics, attend farm visits and do analysis on their home farms through the Farm Business and Planning Module. High on the agenda for our Level 6 cohort is figuring out their next stepswhether that be progression to higher and further education courses or getting a job in the industry. We've dedicated time to helping them fill out application forms, prepare for interviews and generally prepare for life after Gurteen College.

The Part Time and Distance education programmes are vital for those hoping to gain a Certificate in Farming even though they have other life commitments. We are committed to helping these learners on their journey through Agricultural education.

There are currently three Part-Time courses at various stages of completion. Two of the Part Time courses are run two evenings per week. The third Part Time course is being run in conjunction with Bord na Mona and Laois/Offaly ETB. This course runs on a Tuesday and Thursday from 1pm-9pm.There are three Distance courses being run, all of which are at various stages of completion. Two of these courses have students on site once per month on a Friday, and the third course has students on site on a Saturday.

Farm Update

Winter has set in and after our dry summer we are now experiencing a wet winter, nature will generally balance things out and now these wet couple of months will bring us back to our annual average rainfall. Most livestock are in the sheds, and we are busy feeding and bedding, the dairy team has started drying off cows for the winter and our minds are turning to planning for Spring. Preparing calving sheds and calf houses, preparing fertiliser and reseeding plans for the spring. Input costs remain high but the exceptional price for milk is doing much to offset it. With good grain prices too, it puts the farm in a good position entering 2023. The early lambing ewes are expected to start lambing on the 1st of January, which always feels like a great start to the new year and the restarting of the growing cycle.

We have sowed 100 meters of white thorn hedges close to the farmyard with plans for more to be sown around the farm, we continue to promote sustainability and biodiversity. There are many challenges to running a productive profitable farm while being sustainable and increasing biodiversity, but the rewards are definitely there. The butterfly survey conducted by TUS is now completed and the results are being complied, but the initial picture is looking good for biodiversity on the farm, and we look forward to seeing the final report. Work continues with the carbon tower supplied and run by Johnstown Castle, they are building a good picture of the soil carbon content in shallow peat land.
