Relay races feel like a good metaphor for the work of Gurteen during the summer period – let me explain...

The students are 'quick out of the blocks' racing towards the end of term completing their exams and submitting the last pieces of course work. As they leave campus for the final time the baton is passed to the teaching team who 'race down the back straight' to complete all the corrections and calculate the final grades. As external verification and exam boards are concluded the teachers pass the baton to our events and catering teams who 'power through the final bend' building momentum as Gurteen prepares to host numerous high-profile events and many residential youth groups over the summer. Level 5 Agriculture:

Our Level 5 Agriculture groups returned from placement on Monday 22nd April, with the students having had 8 weeks of hands-on practice on farms across Ireland. Since that time the teachers have been working hard to ensure that all exams, skills and assignments are marked.

For the next couple of months, we hope the Level 5's enjoy their summer; but come September we cannot wait to welcome them back and get started once again!

<u>Level 6 Agriculture</u>

The Level 6 Advanced Agriculture students returned from 16 weeks of placement at the end of May. The placement period went very well with students returning from placement having had a very worthwhile experience witnessing a system of farming that they otherwise would not have had a chance to see.

Upon their return, students took part in a lot of project-based classes where any outstanding assignments were completed along with some outstanding theory classes and exams. It's very important to us that the Level 6 students are supported in their ambitions to progress on to further education or go into the workforce and so all students are given to opportunity to meet with a career's guidance counsellor and/or their course tutor should they wish to do so. We're sad to see them go, with them now having completed their two years with us- but we're so excited to see what they go on to achieve now! And although they may no longer be students of Gurteen, they'll always be part of the Gurteen community!



Degree Course Updates

The 1st and 2nd years students of the Ag. Science and Sustainability Degree have completed their studies with us. Both year groups had a very enjoyable year- and we've loved getting to have them onsite and in class!

In September when the 2nd years are back, we're hoping to see some past Level 6 Advanced Certificate Graduates joining the group. This is hugely positive as it demonstrates our ambition to provide a clear route to higher education for all learners joining our level 5 Certificate in Agriculture. The second year of the courses sees students spending all of Semester 1 on the Gurteen campus with all subjects being delivered by Gurteen staff and lecturers. Each semester will see the group carry out a Problem Based Learning exercise whereby they will gain marks for a number of modules in the Semester through having completed one "problem-based project".

Farm Update

This year has felt very tough, it was a long, wet Winter and Spring felt like it would never come. The weather has produced poor grass growth and things are very tight around the farm, the dairy cows are getting fed some silage bales to try slow them down and allow grass a chance to grow.

Besides lack of grass, and the awful weather the farm has been achieving many goals. Our calving and calf rearing were hard work but went very well. Lambing also went very well, and lambs are going to the factory every week now. We did our first cut pit silage about 2 weeks late and the returns were slightly lower than I would have liked but it's in the pit now and safe, ready for feeding in the winter. We made some very good quality baled silage earmarked for the sheep flock and we have made some hayladge that will be fed to the horses when they arrive back on site.

Despite the weather, our winter barley is looking very good, spring barley is finding the weather a challenge and it looks like we will not have a bumper harvest for that crop. The maize and fodder beet we sowed was slow to get going with the cold temperatures but is now moving and growing strong. We're all hopeful of some kinder weather and a flush of growth. Second cut silage is not far away, and we won't feel it until winter barley harvest starts
